

SEEKING A CITY FOR GOD

In Hebrews 11, where we have that great roll-call of heroes of the faith, the writer tells us concerning Abraham: that *he was looking forward to the city that has foundations, whose designer*



and builder is God. (10) Of course, Abraham was not thinking of Ur, or Haran, or Bethel or any of the other places where he spent time in his life's journey with God – but rather he had in mind that celestial city which, in faith, he looked forward one day to being a citizen of. He would serve God in many other cities before that most desirable city would become his eternal residence.

While the city of Belfast is the sphere of labour for the Staff of the Belfast City Mission, their efforts are directed towards helping people to find that other City, the one with eternal foundations whose designer and builder is God. Throughout the past year the missionaries have been helping people, old and young, to seek and find that City.

AN UNCHANGING GOSPEL TO A FAST CHANGING CITY

As ever, the work of a missionary is cross generational; and, as time passes, is becoming increasingly cross cultural as well. Our staff are meeting more and more people whose first language is not English and whose place of birth and homeland is not 'Norn Irn' – they, like Abraham, have become sojourners in a strange land and have made the City of Belfast their refuge and their home.

Belfast too is changing rapidly with renewed and expanding infrastructure and modernised transportation networks – the 'Glider' is a word that is becoming familiar as people adjust to the new public rapid transport system.

How we do 'church' is changing too. In an age where many people no longer attend a church service once, let alone twice, on a Sunday in anything like the numbers they did even a decade ago; it has become necessary to find new and effective ways of reaching people where they are most often to be found. To a degree, this is taking Christian witness back closer to how it was done when the Mission was brought into being not far off 200 years ago.

It is encouraging to note, from the reports submitted by the missionaries, that they are finding new and effective ways to reach people with the gospel – often adapting well tested methods and applying them in fresh strategies; and willingly taking risks to challenge the apathy and indifference that characterises so much of society as we enter the final year of the second decade of the 21st century. People still need to find that *'City that has foundations''* – even if fewer than ever before are conscious of their need or share that desire!

As can be imagined, the work and witness of our staff brings with it a wide variety of challenges. There are encouragements and discouragements, joys and sorrows, successes and failures, trials

and tribulations, fears and apprehensions – and all the other emotions and experiences of Christian witness in this modern age.

WHAT'S IT LIKE – BEING A MISSIONARY TO A BIG CITY?

Here are some insights from the missionaries reports. Many highlight problems with family breakdown, due often to substance abuse – mainly with alcohol, but also growing evidence of drug abuse. There is evidence of a rise in the rate of suicides, especially, but not exclusively, among the young. A missionary speaks of the suicide of a young girl who was part of what was once a church-going family.

Another missionary, who has contact with a homeless hostel, highlights problems with addictions stating that 13 residents have died in a three year period. To address this situation some of our staff have arranged specialised courses on addiction with another Christian Charity working in the field.

Someone once posed the question with regard to trying to influence society for good: which is better, to place an ambulance at the bottom of the cliff; or put a fence at the top? Sadly, by the time the missionary comes into contact with many people with addiction problems, it is the ambulance at the bottom that is the most timely response. The fence at the top is more appropriate for the young and those who may well be tempted to experiment with substances that are inherently addictive. Prevention is always a desirable strategy and so work with and witness among the young remains a vital part of the Mission's work.

The staff, in their reports, speak of both encouragements and challenges in youth and children's work. Finding adequate numbers of suitably trained and sufficiently motivated leaders and teachers remains a perpetual challenge; however there are notable encouragements and successes in many districts. Here is a flavour!

On The Friday night of The Summer Kids Club we invited the parents to come for a fun night/fundraiser'. It was great this year to see different parents and friends! One father stood outside the door shaking because he was uncertain of why his child had asked him to come.... Thanks were expressed by an unsaved grandfather for the time invested in his grandchildren and he gave a generous donation to the work of the hall.

There are successes too with children for whom Belfast is a strange city in a strange land. A young Kurdish boy of 8, who was the interpreter for his family, asked me if I had any toys - he and his sisters didn't have any. Thankfully I had a few games and books left over from the toy appeal at Christmas. It was a joy to hand them over and see the sheer delight on the faces of the children.

As the missionary says: being able to help people practically is a great witness for the Lord. People remember you for your acts of kindness and the hope is that they will understand why we do it. We do it to show the love of God and to bring glory to the Saviour.

Another missionary writes: we have seen a few new faces in the hall, which is a source of great encouragement, particularly one young man who had recently become a Christian and was "looking what to do next...". Previously coming to our Youth Club, he just came through the doors and wanted to know more. This young man is really looking at how to live for God, despite a friendship

circle that may try and dissuade him. To see him continue to come as and when work permits means we can talk things through and we hope to see him grow and mature in the Christian walk.

We had another young man restored to faith around this time so it is a joy to share reading materials and to talk of the things of God!

As always, an indispensable ingredient in the work that the missionaries and their workers do is prayer. This comment is typical: Our prayer team is getting stronger with a real desire to touch God's Throne for our district. Souls have come to know the Lord this past year and new connections made with families in real need.

Of course the routine of preaching and pastoral work of the mission continues in every district. Sunday evenings and on various nights of the week the scriptures are preached and taught to people of all ages and at all stages of life. In some districts the meetings are small in number, yet the missionaries are faithful to God and to His Word. Although, as in churches, Sunday School and youth work is becoming more difficult, yet faithful teachers and leaders continue to instruct the young in the values of eternity. This is a priceless investment in young lives that we trust will yield spiritual fruit that will endure to eternity.

VARIED METHODS – CONSISTENT MESSAGE

Special occasions present opportunities for the gospel and the mission staff are adept at devising and planning 'special occasions' as often as is practicable – harvest, Christmas, Easter, organisation displays and parents nights, box openings, tea parties, men's fellowships, footballing for Christ, special missions and teaching weeks. All of this in addition to speaking at school assemblies, residential homes, kids clubs, mums and tots, craft classes, homework clubs, language classes, advice centres, the list is multifaceted and virtually endless.

Summer months sees Holiday Bible Clubs, Five Day Clubs, summer camps, family fun days, football camp etc..

There has probably never been a time in the entire history of the Belfast City Mission when as many different and varied approaches have been employed in attempting to reach people with the gospel of Christ – yet the need remains greater than can be addressed.

In the routine work of visiting people in their homes, at their doors, in places that they frequent either willingly or unwillingly (like periods of hospitalisation); of offering comfort and help in situations of bereavement or receiving bad news regarding health issues – in all of this the missionary is God's representative at the time and in the place of need.

This is a work that takes its toll on the energy levels and coping mechanisms of even the strongest in character and robust in faith; and so the prayer support of the believers within the Mission and throughout the wider Church is vital to present and future fruitfulness – as the Mission continues to SEEK A CITY FOR GOD!

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281st NI GIRLS' BRIGADE RATHCOOLE RETIREMENT OF CAROLYN HEWITT (CAPTAIN)

The Belfast City Mission, Rathcoole Girls' Brigade was founded in September 1977 and Carolyn Hewitt has been the only Captain since its formation. Carolyn started as a GB girl in Abbots Cross Presbyterian Church and became an Officer while in their G.B. Company before she was appointed as Captain here in Belfast City Mission Rathcoole.

When the company was formed in 1977 Rathcoole Estate was the biggest in Europe and a very different place than it is today. Our GB Company provided a safe and secure environment for girls to meet, for many it was there only interest outside of school or home. Carolyn ensured that every girls needs were catered for by providing activities, days away and Camps etc.

In those days, to most families, holidays were a luxury they couldn't afford and GB Camp provided the girls with an opportunity to escape their everyday lives and form lifelong friendships. If the families couldn't afford it, Carolyn ensured the girls went anyway.

Throughout the years Carolyn has taken great pleasure in nurturing girls through our Company and seeing them reach their full potential. Now Carolyn is having the joy of seeing the second and third generations of some families join the Company. She knows all the families individually and can often tell who a girls Mummy or Granny is instantly.

Over the years, Carolyn has made a massive personal commitment to our Company, in terms of both time and energy. At one point, different sections of the Company were meeting on three separate days, Tiny Tots and Explorers on a Saturday morning, Bible Class on a Sunday morning and the rest of the Company on a Monday night and Carolyn was always there to make sure things were running smoothly, she was first through the door and last out at the end of the night. In addition to her responsibilities within her own Company, she also played an extremely active role in running the Glenabbey District of the Girls' Brigade for many years.

On a personal level, girls know they can confide in her and that she is there to quietly provide practical, emotional and most importantly spiritual support in any situation. Many families could testify that Carolyn has been their rock in times of bereavement, illness and even, on occasions, financial difficulties.

However, to this day, Carolyn remains extremely humble and has never sought any praise or recognition for her efforts. Carolyn has undoubtedly been a friend, role model and confidante to hundreds of girls over the last 42 years.

At our 42nd Annual Display on Friday 6th April 2019 Carolyn announced that she would retire as Captain of the Company but to all of our pleasure would remain as President.

The impact that Carolyn has made to individual lives and families of the Rathcoole District and further afield cannot be put into words Eternity alone will only tell.

A MEMO FROM THE SECRETARY
